# Safety at Ewalu This Summer

#### **Communication**



- We will continue to post COVID-19 updates on our Facebook page and the COVID-19 page on our website. More information can be found at www.ewalu.org/covid19/.
- We will notify registered camper families of enhanced screening and registration procedures before their arrival at camp.
- Parents and summer staff will be sent a health assessment screening form to be completed at home for the fourteen days prior to their, or their child's arrival at camp.
- Initial onsite health screenings will be performed before campers exit their vehicles.
- Campers with a high risk of complications from a COVID-19 infection, or who are living with a high-risk individual, are recommended to not attend camp this summer.




#### Registration



- Registration will be done in a drive-thru style with outdoor stations manned by camp staff.
- Families will be asked to stay in their vehicles. Campers can exit after completing the registration process.
- Registration times will be staggered by program area.
- Social distancing will be practiced in cabin groups and program areas for all camp activities this summer.
- Large group activities that exceed a single program area are suspended for the summer.
- Meals will be served and eaten in program areas with cabin groups. Whenever possible, mealtimes will be staggered by program, to maintain social distancing.

## Cleaning & Sanitization



- Living areas will be sanitized twice daily and between groups. Other buildings will have increased cleaning and sanitization procedures depending on usage.
- All campers and staff will have regular access to hand washing and/or hand sanitizing supplies.
- Facemasks will be mandatory inside buildings, and outside when social distancing is difficult, except when sleeping and eating. Parents should pack one facemask per day for their child. We have a limited supply of facemasks.
- Each camper and staff member will have their temperature and symptoms checked daily.
- If anyone on site exhibits COVID-19 symptoms or has a fever of over 100.4 Fahrenheit they will be quarantined on camp until a parent or guardian can take them home.
